Our Story:

The Bob Brown House is an independent living facility for adults with physical and/or mental challenges. We opened in 1974 on Rogers Road in Lexington. For more than 45 years we have been providing safe, affordable housing for this often-neglected population. There are 14 residents ranging in age from 20's to 80's. We prepare all meals for residents and have 24/7 staff on site for their care and protection. Rent is based on income from their disability or social security. All utilities and supplies are included in their rent. The average rent is \$650 per month. Residents help offset the cost of groceries with their SNAP food stamp card. That benefit covers about half of our food costs. There is a huge need for affordable housing for this population. We receive calls and emails weekly looking for help. Many of our residents are young people wanting to live on their own for the first time. Others are middle aged adults that have lived with their parents until the parents have died or are no longer able to care for them. Sadly, several of our residents would be homeless due to mental illness and their inability to work. For all of them the support and assistance we provide is the key to their success in living independently. Because of this huge need and our desire to help others we have expanded our mission by adding two new facilities in the last year. At our Rogers Rd property we built 24 additional apartments with new living room, dining room, kitchen and laundry. This expansion was funded by several grants and low-income housing tax credits. The first residents came in August and we were completely full by January. Last spring we purchased a beautiful, rural property that was formerly a nursing home. We completely renovated the building with new flooring, paint, lighting, bath fixtures and furniture. There are 18 apartments and the first residents came in November. Presently, we are half full and most of those residents were homeless. The annual budget at the Bob Brown House is only \$120,000. Within that amount we maintain a 45- year-old building, provide 24/7 staff, purchase food to prepare 3 meals a day to 14 adults and pay all utilities, insurance and taxes. The rents paid by residents covers about 75% of our budget. We must raise the rest through fundraising and the support of individuals and organizations in our community. The Bob Brown House receives no government funding to support our daily operations. Your support is vital to our mission of serving this special population.
